

#### CHAIR'S REPORT

Year ended 5 April 2017

The main focus for the year has been to embark in earnest on the distribution of Marie-Louise von Motesiczky's paintings and drawings to public collections. In a letter of 1987 Marie-Louise wrote: 'Every picture counts...I am only concerned that the work I have put all my strength into over the last sixty years should not disappear..The paintings are meaningless when they cannot be seen..museums are the only place where they are safe. I do not live to see this myself, but I want their future to be secure, just as other people want this for their children.'

Significant groups of work have been presented to the Albertina in Vienna, Marie-Louise's home city; the Boijmans van Beuningen Museum in Rotterdam, in recognition of her strong ties to Holland, and Tate which already had a small group of paintings, two of which have been on view at Tate Modern. In addition, gifts have been made to the following collections: the National Portrait Gallery in London, St Anne's College, Oxford and the Deutsche Schillergesellschaft in Marbach.

Every effort is being made to keep related drawings together with her paintings. The Trustees are intent on matching the donations to the places and contexts that were significant to Marie-Louise and her subjects, as well as requiring evidence of an active interest in promoting Marie-Louise's work. Further gifts are in hand for 2017-18.

The Trustees submit their annual report and the financial statements of the Marie-Louise von Motesiczky Charitable Trust for the year ended 5 April 2017. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the Charity comply with the requirements of the Charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2005).

# Structure, Governance and Management

The company was incorporated on the 21 March 2011 as a company limited by guarantee and subsequently registered as a charity on the 25 March 2011 (charity registration number 1140890). The company took over the assets and liabilities of the Marie-Louise von Motesiczky Charitable Trust (an unincorporated charity of the same name - charity registration number 1059380) on the 5 April 2011 and now carries out the activities previously performed by the unincorporated charity.

The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the provisions of the Articles of Association. The names of the Trustees are given on page 1. The Trustees are responsible for the management of the Charity and the furtherance of its charitable purposes as given below. The Trustees meet as a body on a regular basis, generally around five times a year. The Trustees are directly involved in the day to day running of the Charity, led by the Chair, with assistance when required from the Charity's professional advisers. The Chair is the principal point of contact for the Charity Commission.

The Trustees have continued to monitor the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Charity, and are satisfied that the internal controls already in place are commensurate with the size of the Charity and provide a reasonable degree of comfort.

# **Charitable Objects**

The objects of the Charity as set out in the Memorandum and Articles are as follows:

- 1) The advancement of the education of the public in the fine arts particularly painting and sculpture by any means but primarily by:
- i. arranging public exhibitions of paintings and works of art and in particular those by Marie-Louise von Motesiczky,
- ii. The publication of literary works about the life and works of artists including Marie-Louise von Motescizky.
- 2) The relief of diseases and other medical conditions impairing vision by assisting with the payment of medical and other expenses incurred in the treatment and care of eyes, including but not limited to, the costs of patient care, support and assistance to enable sufferers to live independently.
- 3) The general purposes of such charitable bodies or for such other purposes as shall be exclusively charitable as the Trustees may from time to time decide.

The Trustees consider that the objectives and activities of the Charity meet the public benefit requirements as set out in Charities Act 2011.

# **Achievements and Public Benefit**

In pursuit of the charitable objects, the Trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The activities described below have been undertaken throughout the course of the year to further each of the objects for the public benefit. The Trustees are keen to emphasise that:

- We focus on projects which are linked to Marie-Louise's personal history and interests.
- We do not accept unsolicited applications and only fund organisations registered as charities in England and Wales.
- · We look for effective leadership and governance.
- · We recognise the value of core funding.
- We value a reflexive approach and honesty about what works or does not work well.
- We ask that grantees do their best to draw the attention of beneficiaries to the life and work of Marie-Louise von Motesiczky (1906-1996).
- 1) The advancement of the education of the public in the fine arts particularly painting and sculpture by any means, but primarily by:
  - arranging public exhibitions of paintings and works of art and in particular those by Marie-Louise von Motesiczky,
  - ii. the publication of literary works about the life and works of artists including Marie-Louise von Motescizky.
  - **1.1. Donations** of Marie-Louise's work have been made as follows (further details of works in publicly accessible collections can be found on the Charity's website http://www.motesiczky.org/works/public-collections/):
  - Albertina, Vienna
  - 2 paintings, 8 drawings and 1 sketchbook (two more paintings are to be given in 2017-18 after returning from loan)
  - Boijmans van Beuningen Museum, Rotterdam
  - 11 paintings, 7 drawings, and 2 sketchbooks
  - Deutsches Literaturarchiv, part of the Deutsche Schillergesellschaft, Marbach
  - 1 painting and 2 related drawings

Conversation in the Library, the subject of the painting dating from 1950, shows the anthropologist and poet Franz Baermann Steiner, in conversation with the Viennese writer Elias Canetti at the Motesiczky house in Amersham. Steiner's papers, which belong to the Deutsches Literaturarchiv, include correspondence from Marie-Louise. The donation was displayed there and published in *Die Gabe* (The Gift), a survey of notable recent acquisitions that opened in November 2016.

- National Portrait Gallery, London
- 1 painting. Marie-Louise gave a portrait of her former lover Elias Canetti to the NPG in 1992, in thanks 'to Britain for giving a home to my mother and me'. Her striking self-portrait of 1959 just presented by the Charity, was Canetti's favourite portrait of Marie-Louise. It went on display at the NPG in May 2017 as part of a group of self-portraits by émigré artists of the 1930s and 1940s.
- · St Anne's College, Oxford
- 1 drawing, a study for Marie-Louise's portrait of the writer Iris Murdoch (1964) which Murdoch presented to the College where she was a Fellow.
- Tate
- 3 paintings, 25 drawings and 1 sketchbook (1 more painting scheduled for donation in 2017-18 after return from loan).

- **1.2 Loans:** Four paintings were lent to the Jüdisches Museum, Vienna for the exhibition *The better half: Jewish Women Artists before 1938* (4 November 2016 1 May 2017). As with other loans of Marie-Louise's work, the Charity covered the cost of transportation.
- 1.3 Publication and Research: The gift made in 2016 to the Fitzwilliam Museum of St Christopher Meeting the Devil, by an early sixteenth century artist of the Danube School, was published in the Burlington Magazine's supplement on new acquisitions at the Fitzwilliam, in December 2016. It was also the subject of a piece in the local Cambridge press to mark Holocaust Memorial Day on 27 January 2017, because of the connection to Marie-Louise's brother Karl, who died in Auschwitz on 25 June 1943. The Trustees commissioned an article from Ines Schlenker, author of the catalogue raisonné of Marie-Louise's paintings, on the history of the work from 1938-49, when it was subject to Nazi expropriation. The painting was sold at auction in Vienna in October 1943, acquired by the Bavarian State Museums in Munich and then returned to Marie-Louise 's mother Henriette in 1949, after she was alerted to its whereabouts and made her claim.
- **1.4 Max Beckmann drawings:** access was given by the Charity to the co-author of the forthcoming catalogue raisonné of Beckmann's drawings; photographs were provided free of charge to this scholarly project.
- 1.5. MLvM Archive at Tate, 2015-17: work has continued on the digitisation of the core materials within the archive which has involved considerable effort on Tate's part in tracking down copyright holders for materials other than those emanating from Marie-Louise, her mother Henriette and brother Karl. For the latter, the Trustees have granted a Creative Commons Licence to enable Tate to make them more widely available.
- 1.6 Courtauld Institute of Art 2014-16: The MA special option, A Minor Modernism? Central European Art and Culture 1918-1956 was completed by the full complement of eight students in June 2016, of whom six achieved Merit and two a Distinction; one of the students was awarded the prize for the best MA dissertation in the year. Because of an underspend on the original grant, the Trustees agreed to the creation of a post-doctoral fellowship, to be appointed in September 2017 for nine months, to assist with a Reader in Central European Art and Culture 1918-1956 for publication in the open access Courtauld Books Online series, in the autumn of 2018.
- 2) The relief of diseases and other medical conditions impairing vision by assisting with the payment of medical and other expenses incurred in the treatment and care of eyes, including but not limited to, the costs of patient care, support and assistance to enable sufferers to live independently.
  - 2.1 Emotional Support Worker Co-ordinator / Eye Clinic Liaison Officer, Moorfields Eye Hospital 2015-17: Jessica Price who was appointed to the position in October 2015, has continued development of the volunteer programme across the six satellite sites that comprise Moorfields East, where the need was deemed to be greatest. Since March 2016 Jessica has been managing the Certificate of Vision Impairment (CVI) across the East London sites (hitherto this was done from the main Moorfields City Road site), which has had a positive impact on the number of patients certified, and in ensuring that all patients are offered registration and appropriate support; from November 2015

- **2.1** (continued) to August 2017, 595 referrals were made. Since December 2016 over thirty emotional support workers have operated across the six sites, supporting 2,287 patients. The Eye Clinic Liaison Officer is responsible for their training and day to day management in conjunction with the Thomas Pocklington Trust and the senior nurse at each site. Feedback shows that 95% found the support service improved their visit and 100% would like to see the programme continue. The Chair of the MLvM Charitable Trust attended one of the preliminary training sessions for prospective volunteers in March 2017.
- 3) The general purposes of such charitable bodies or for such other purposes as shall be exclusively charitable as the Trustees may from time to time decide.
  - 3.1 British Museum International Training Programme: 2016 was the eleventh year of the programme and the sixth since the Motesiczky Trust began its support of what has become a truly global network. 228 fellows from 33 countries had participated by the end of the 2016 summer season, 24 of them funded by the MLvM Charitable Trust. In 2016 altogether there were 21 fellows from 13 countries; the five supported by the MLvM Charitable Trust came from Croatia, Lebanon, Sudan and Turkey. Past participants have the opportunity to apply to return as senior fellows to assist with the running of the summer programme. Further initiatives included two collaborations between ITP alumni and the British Museum and/or one of the BM's UK partner museums for the programme: an online exhibition is being developed as an outcome from ITP's 10th anniversary workshop in Mumbai in 2015 involving alumni from India, Nigeria and Palestine, and the Senior Curator of World Cultures at Bristol Museum and Art Gallery, and a workshop on Learning, engagement and museums was organized in Yerevan, Armenia in October 2016, bringing together alumni from Armenia with the Manchester Museum and Art Gallery and the British Museum. New short ITP+ courses were prepared for delivery in 2017-18 and the first round of ITP Collaborative Awards was launched, for projects submitted by alumni that take advantage of ITP networks and partnerships.
  - **3.2** Carers UK, 2016-17: The MLvM Charitable Trust awarded a twelve-month grant for 2016-17 to improve digital resources for carers, using a single online platform to be accessed by a network of affiliated local authorities which subscribe to the service. They can customise the platform to add links to resources in their areas.

The Chair of the MLvM Charitable Trust attended a reception at the House of Commons in November 2016 and an impressive creative writing awards event in February 2017, to encourage carers to express and share what can often be a very isolating experience.

3.3 HMP Grendon/Ikon – Artist in residence 2014-17: Edmund Clark has continued his residency at HMP Grendon, which is being run in conjunction with Ikon Gallery in Birmingham. On 23 November 2016, Edmund, in conjunction with the men, organised the second exhibition of prisoners' work at Grendon, which was attended by people from London, including the Koestler Trust and two of the MLvM Trustees, from Birmingham City and Oxford and Cambridge Universities, and from the vicinity of Grendon itself. It is hugely important to bring outsiders to the prison as well as fostering the men's participation in the annual Koestler Prize exhibition at the South Bank Centre in London, where they regularly win awards. One of the most successful exhibitors from Grendon, who has since moved to another prison, had the following to say in a letter read out at the event on 23 November: 'Having spent thirteen years in prison I met Edmund Clark and from there I got amazing support from both him and yourselves [the Trustees of the MLvM Charity] and I got to make amends..nothing I write would describe how lucky I was to have your support even though you haven't met me, you helped me to change myself and hopefully one day to positively change my future.'

- **3.3 (continued)** Ikon published a booklet on the first year of Edmund's residency. The evaluation by the Centre for Applied Criminology at Birmingham City University is well underway, work proceeds towards the third exhibition at Grendon in November 2017, and Edmund Clark's own exhibition at Ikon of work done in response to what he has experienced at Grendon, which will run from December 2017 February 2018. At the time of writing his major exhibition at the Imperial War Museum, of photography and texts, called *War on Terror* has just closed after running from July 2016 August 2017.
- **3.4** Help Musicians UK 2014-17 Karl Motesiczky Scholarships: two scholarships for cellists were awarded following auditions held on 11 April 2017, just outside the period of this report, which will be taken up in September 2017 for postgraduate study and two years' early professional development beyond. The award winners are: Jamal Aliyev, currently studying at the Royal College of Music, and Toby White from the Guildhall School of Music.

The 2016 Karl Motesiczky Scholar, Abel Selaocoe, has been accepted onto the Royal Northern College's International Artist Diploma course from September 2017, following his final year of Master's study at the same College. Michael Petrov (2015) has had a full concert schedule following completion of his postgraduate studies; the funding from the Motesiczky award is being used to build his web site and to support the distribution cost of the first CD by Trio Isimsiz to which he belongs (violin, cello and piano). The trio won 1st Prize in the 2015 Trondheim International Chamber Music Competition and 2nd prize in the 2017 Haydn International Competition in Vienna. Alexander Rolton (2014) who specialises in early music, has used a portion of his funding for the purchase of a high quality baroque bow, for maintenance costs and a new case for his cello, as well as travel to Leipzig in 2016 for the Bach Competition.

**3.5** Koestler Trust, 2016-18 - Marie-Louise von Motesiczky mentoring awards: the first of the mentoring awards was completed, involving ten sessions with a professional artist trained for this work. After time in prison, the candidate had moved to the forensic mental health service provided at Chase Farm Hospital. He expressed gratitude to the Koestler scheme and to the tutor for motivating him to continue pursuing his interest in the arts, including applying for a Foundation Year at a London college of Further Education. He was also pleased to be offered part-time work as an art technician at London University.

A second award has been made for 2017-18 to an inmate at HMP Ford (Ford Open Prison) in Arundel.

3.6 The Funding Network, 2016-18 — International Project Director: TFN International now features on the masthead of the redesigned TFN web site, giving it greater prominence within the organisation. Eugénie Harvey and her colleagues continue to provide support, online and in person, to community partner organisations worldwide, especially in eastern Europe where training is given for running crowd-funding events. Russia was a new country to come on stream in 2016-17. TFN International is collaborating with Professor Jason Franklin at the Johnson Centre of Philanthropy, Grand Valley State University, Michigan, on a research project looking at the impact of the giving circle groups in central and eastern Europe on local delivery partners, donors and funded organisations. The aim is to demonstrate the value of TFN's giving model beyond raising funds, e.g. in building philanthropic infrastructure and supporting the development of civil society.

3.6 (continued) In Australia TFN has inspired its first stand-alone non-profit organization, TFN Australia, dedicated to the delivery of giving-circle events based on the UK TFN model. At the event held in 2016 to celebrate TFN Australia's fourth anniversary, AUD175,000 was raised for grassroots causes.

3.7 Tricycle Theatre 2014-17: - Minding the Gap, (learning programme with secondary schools and Further Education Colleges in the London Borough of Brent): During the academic year from September 2015 to July 2016, Tricycle worked with over 300 students - young migrants, refugees and asylum seekers – from the City Learning Centre at Queens Park Community School, the Greenway Project at Claremont School, Newman Catholic College and the College of North West London, to deliver more than 450 creative workshops. This included film as well as theatre and two public performances on stage at Tricycle as part of the annual Takeover Festival, when Tricycle's youth groups are responsible for the entire performance programme for one week. Minding the Gap is invaluable in developing the students' English language skills, confidence and social cohesion, as well as their engagement with drama of all kinds and the practicalities of its realisation.

For the academic year September 2016 – July 2017, while the theatre is closed for capital development, Minding the Gap was delivered off-site at schools or community locations, working with around 170 students. Two major new initiatives are the Minding the Gap Young Company to offer scope for continued participation beyond the school/college programme for young people to take part in free drama workshops. They work with a professional director and writer to create their own play to be performed during the year. The Company will also have the opportunity to complete the Bronze Arts Award (Arts Council England/Trinity College) and older members helped to access training as peer motivators and workshop assistants.

In May 2017, the Trustees agreed to continue support of *Minding the Gap* for another three years (2017-2020) at £40,000 p.a.

#### **Financial Perfomance**

The Statement of Financial Activities shows net expenditure before gains and losses on investment disposals and revaluations during the year of £1,615,173 (2016 - £1,176,762). The net expenditure includes grants and donations to various bodies amounting to £1,629,096 (2016 - £1,171,177). The net assets of the Charity reduced during the year from £11,723,055 to £11,290,966.

## Reserves policy

The Charity is dependent on income from its investments to fund its day to day activities. The Charity has built up sufficient reserves to be able to continue to meet its objectives if there is a shortfall in income. The Trustees consider that the level of liquid reserves should be sufficient to cover a period of at least 6 months overheads. The Charity's assets currently include works of art valued at £3,623,752 which do not currently generate any income but are integral to the objectives of the Charity.

# **Investment Policy and Performance**

The Trustees may invest the monies of the Charitable Trust not immediately required for its purposes in or upon such investments, securities or property as may be thought fit. The works of art are not income producing and thus the Trustees have been reliant for income from the listed investments and on interest on term deposits. The listed investments have been invested in a mixture of income and growth investments. The Trustees regularly review the portfolio of listed investments with Coutts & Co, the investment managers, who by agreement adopt a cautious view of the investment portfolio.

The company has taken advantage of the small companies' exemption in preparing the report above. The Trusteees declare that they have approved the Trustee's Report (including directors' report) above.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the detection and prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# 1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP): Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Iremland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

### 1.2 Company Status

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the Charity are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the Charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the Charity.

### 1.3 Fund accounting

The Charity maintains a general fund which is unrestricted and is available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for any other purpose.

The Charity has no restricted or designated funds.

#### 1.4 Income

All investment and deposit income is recognised on a receipts basis.

# 1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Charitable activities are those costs wholly for the furtherance of the Charity's objectives including grants and donations and expenditure on research, exhibition and catalogue costs and restoration and conservation costs.

Other expenditure are those costs incurred in connection with the administration of the Charity.

#### 1.6 Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The SOFA includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals during the year.

#### 1.7 Overseas Currencies

Assets and liabilities in overseas currencies are converted into sterling at the rate applicable at the year end.

Profits and losses on disposals are calculated by reference to the market value at 5 April 2016 and to the cost of any subsequent additions.

The works of art, comprising numerous paintings and letters, have been valued by the Trustees at an estimated open market value of £3,623,752 as at 5 April 2017. The individual works of art are mainly valued in dollars converted into sterling at the year end exchange rate. The net loss on revaluation during the year of £298,093 is made up of exchange gains of £548,839 less a provision for impairment of £846,532.

Disposals of works of art in the year at proceeds amounting to £1,281,877 represents the value of works donated during the year and included in note 3. The profit on disposal thereof represents the difference between the value of the donation and the relevant book value at 5 April 2016.

One of the works of art is valued at £600,000. Otherwise none of the investments is valued at more than 5% of the total value of the Charity's assets.

### INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT
